## DOH-St. Lucie County Reminds Residents to Avoid Contact with Wild and Stray Animals

**St. Lucie County, Fla. –** The Florida Department of Health in St. Lucie County (DOH-St. Lucie) urges residents to avoid contact with wild and stray animals to prevent rabies exposure.

## Remember these tips to protect yourself, family members, and pets:

- Immunize your pets and livestock based on your veterinarian's recommended schedule.
- Keep pets under direct supervision and on a leash, and keep livestock secured on your property. If an animal bites your pet or livestock, seek veterinary assistance for the animal immediately and contact St. Lucie County's Animal Safety Services & Protection Division at 772-462-8120.
- Avoid contact with wild or stray animals. Do not handle, feed, or unintentionally attract
  them with outdoor pet food, open garbage cans, or other sources of food. If you have
  been bitten or scratched by a wild or domestic animal, seek medical attention, and report
  the injury to DOH-St. Lucie by calling 772-462-3883.
- Never adopt wild animals or bring them into your home; instead contact a <u>licensed</u> wildlife rehabilitator.
- Call your local animal control agency to remove any stray animals from your neighborhood. Contact St. Lucie County's Animal Safety Services & Protection Division 772-462-8120.
- Prevent wildlife, including <u>bats</u>, from entering living quarters or occupied spaces in homes, schools, and other similar areas where they might come in contact with people and pets.
